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Dr Uros T. Todorovic (Ouresis Todorovich) is a contemporary artist and a theorist of art. His area of research includes Ancient art (of Greece, Mesopotamia and Persia), the art of Late Antiquity, Medieval art, Byzantine art, Renaissance art, Early Modern art, the aesthetics of 20th century Modern art, Contemporary art, Theology, as well as Philosophy. He was born in Jagodina, Serbia, and grew up in Belgrade where he began his studies in sculpture. He migrated to Australia at the age of twenty and completed his studies there, expanding his interests significantly. His doctoral research brought him to Greece in early 2007. In 2012 he successfully defended his doctoral thesis entitled *The Diachronic Character of Late Byzantine Painting: The Hermeneutics of Vision from Mistra to New York*. His professional experience covers the fields of painting, sculpture, teaching, conservation of cultural heritage and translation. His artworks have been exhibited at a number of significant exhibitions in USA, Australia, Greece and Serbia. This study was published in 2015 by Sebastian Press (Alhambra, California) within a Volume entitled *The Ways of Byzantine Philosophy*. The same study was also published in the E-Journal / The Athens Dialogues.

Brief description of the topic: The study attempts to contribute to the understanding of the often elusive theological influences in the Byzantine art of the Pre-Iconoclast period. It focuses on the unfolded marble panels inside the interior of Hagia Sophia of Constantinople and particularly on the way in which their selection and the conception of their installation may have been influenced by the mystical teachings of Dionysius the Pseudo-Areopagite and possibly by those of Gregory of Nyssa. The likelihood of other, philosophical influences is also considered, such as the teachings of Plotinus.

- From Athena to Theotokos: The Classical Origin of the Mosaic in the Conch of the Apse of Hagia Sophia in Constantinople

Brief description of the topic: In this study I demonstrated that due to the influences from examples of Ancient Greek classical sculpture and their Roman copies, the 9th century mosaic rendering of the Virgin in the conch of the apse of Hagia Sophia marks the historical beginning of a new cultural as well as spiritual orientation in Byzantium. I note that I have received excellent reports from the examiners of my PhD thesis. The title of my PhD thesis (2012) is: *The Diachronic Character of Late Byzantine Painting: The Hermeneutics of Vision from Mistra to New York*. The first part of the thesis examines the aesthetics of Late Byzantine painting, while the second part examines the influence of the aesthetics of Late Byzantine painting on the 20th century abstract painting, therein focusing on the work of Vasily Kandinsky, Kazimir Malevich and Mark Rothko. NOTE: I have also completed an extensive study on Byzantine influences in Greek Modernism, which is yet to be published.
